## A Montessori Approach





#### At Highland, our students are leaders.

Each member of the Highland community has committed to help our students learn how to evaluate information while nurturing the students' compassion, curiosity, and sense of personal power. Through our classes and programs, we are raising the next generation of courageous leaders.

#### **COMMUNITY CAFÉ**

The Community Café is our approach to the traditional Montessori micro-economy. Managed by our adolescents, the café is open before and after school, Monday through Friday. Students learn entrepreneurial skills while selling coffee and treats to Highland visitors and parents. The students' critical thinking skills blossom when they learn from their mistakes. The adolescents build off of each other's knowledge and learn cooperative management.

"One afternoon, a group of alumni visited the school after the café had closed for the afternoon. They went down to the café to check out the changes and they returned upstairs to the adolescent classroom LIVID. The café was not cleaned and prepared up to their standards for the next morning. They had quite a few questions and words for their peers. It was wonderful to watch! That is what you want. You want to build the community knowledge to the point where everyone knows what the standards are and they are all invested in making sure we meet those standards."

A Montessori Approach

Our students are empathetic lifelong learners and leaders. Highland Community school is a place where children are free to choose and are held accountable for their choices. It is a community that embraces our differences and respects each individual's journey. Our staff and faculty model respect and kindness for our students and the students follow suit.

#### MONTESSORI MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Our Montessori Model United Nations program is a year-long project that leads our 6th graders through the academically rigorous process of becoming United Nations ambassadors. They spent all year researching difficult subjects like domestic violence and immigration issues. In March 2016, they participated in a global conference in New York City at the United Nations Assembly Hall. We were one of the few public schools in attendance. The experience of collaborating and negotiating with their peers from all over the world gave these students a perspective on leadership that is impossible to match in the classroom.

#### LOVING TO LEARN STARTS EARLY

Highland is a place where children love to learn and that love starts early. In our toddler community children ages 14 months to 3 years are empowered use their blossoming autonomy. In 2015-16, our teachers guided 12 students as they grew their self-confidence and learned to take care of their basic needs. Our toddler community is the only early childhood education program in Milwaukee where all the teachers are certified by the American Montessori Society.





## Community

#### Highland is a community school.

In 1968, it was founded on the principles of parents working together to create a place that honors the intelligence, creativity, and sensitivity of children. Forty-eight years later, we still focus on creating a nurturing school for students and their families.

Highland parents are the backbone of our school. Each parent commits to volunteer for 36 hours each school year. That commitment governs our school, keeps the building and grounds beautiful, and helps our students succeed.

A Highland parent sums it up best:

"At Highland, we enroll the whole family."

#### **GLOBAL YOUTH SERVICE DAY**

In the 2015-16 school year, we concentrated on building on the community feel inside the school and extending it out into the wider Milwaukee community and the world. In partnership with the Nonprofit Center of Milwaukee and Youth Changing the World, Highland hosted Milwaukee's Global Youth Service Day Celebration. Our students and parents started the day by volunteering to clean up the neighborhood. After the hard work, the celebration began. With food, music, dancing, and a lot of laughter, attendees celebrated the positive impact of youth service in Milwaukee.







## Arts

Our arts program builds community and deepens our awareness of the world. In the 2015-16 school year, the arts program at Highland helped students share their own unique messages with the world.

#### MILWAUKEE ART MUSEUM DOCENT PROGRAM

This past year's graduates of the Junior Docent program was one of our school's best, and according to director of the program at the Milwaukee Art Museum, one of the *strongest showings of any school* in the Milwaukee area. Last year's sixth year students spent long hours in the art room making reproductions from the museum's collection. Their presentations and creative responses were thoughtful, articulate, and very mature.

#### HIGHLAND COMMUNITY PLAYERS

The Highland Community Players is Highland's theatrical arts program. The Players have been producing raw and original works that respect the intelligence of their actors and audience. The 2015-16 school year was no exception. The Lower Elementary kids (grades 1-3) took center stage at the 4th Annual Highland Circus, a school talent show that introduces young performers to performing in front of a crowd. The culmination of the season was the adolescent (grades 7 and 8) performance of Stephen Gregg's comedy, This is a Test. This final show was notably heartwarming because this 8th grade class began our drama program in 2009 when they were just 1st graders.

The Upper Elementary Play addressed the serious issues of labeling, stereotypes, and self-fulfilling prophecies in *The Bully, The Liar, & The Thief.* Fifty-four students took on a variety of roles, from acting to stage crew. It paid tribute to the Western film genre and included great music legends, including musicians who recorded in Grafton, WI. The show earned praise from local media outlets and a Citation of Commendation from State Representative Evan Goyke.





## Care of the Environment

Children learn to love and respect the earth by getting their hands dirty. However, many children do not have the opportunity to connect with natural spaces on a regular basis. Therefore, connecting students to nature, embedding environmental education into the curriculum, and greening our school grounds is a top priority for Highland.

#### NATURAL GROUND REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT

The Natural Grounds Redevelopment Project is about planting and cultivating the seeds of a strong environmental ethic in our children. We are re-imagining our outdoor space to be a natural learning environment for us all. A few years ago, we began this journey by installing raised bed gardens during a parent volunteer day. We've been steadily modifying the grounds ever since. In 2015, we purchased the building from Milwaukee Public Schools which allowed us more freedom to alter the school grounds. Through a partnership with MMSD, three bioswales were installed on the property. We also partnered with Reflo to create the Phase 2 plan for the Natural Grounds that will guide us in future developments. We are a school committed to developing the child as a whole and taking in to consideration the significance of our interactions with the environment that sustains us. By sowing these seeds, our students influence their families and the community at large.

#### **GREEN SCHOOL CONSORTIUM**

As members of the Green Schools Consortium of Milwaukee, Highland has quickly become a leader in the greening school grounds in Milwaukee and hosted the first ever Green Schools Design and Development Conference this past June. This conference brought together stakeholders to share green infrastructure plans and network together while inspiring more schools to break ground. We were proud to share our lessons learned and help other schools in their efforts!


